CANDIDATES SOUGHT FOR 2016 BOARD ELECTION

The Doyon, Limited board of directors is seeking qualified individuals who want to serve on the Doyon board. To be eligible, a candidate must be a voting Doyon shareholder who is at least 18 years of age.

There are four director seats, each with a term of three years, up for election. Shareholders will vote to fill the seats at the March 2016 Doyon annual meeting.

Current directors whose terms expire at the March 2016 annual meeting are Shirley Cleaver, Lee DeWilde, Sonta Hamilton Roach and Miranda Wright. To be listed as a candidate in Doyon's proxy materials, the interested shareholder must submit a board candidate information form. The form will be available beginning Tuesday, September 8 at www.doyon.com. Please contact the Doyon legal

Doyon must receive completed forms no later than 5 p.m. on Monday, October 19, 2015. Please note that this is an application receipt deadline and not a postmark deadline. UPDATE ON DOYON AND AUCTION 97

Earlier this year, Doyon, Limited participated in Auction 97, the most recent Federal Communications Commission (FCC) wireless spectrum auction. The radiofrequency spectrum licenses that were in the auction are necessary to support wireless networks, which are used by cell phones and other wireless devices. Doyon participated in Auction 97 through the FCC's designated entity (DE) program.

When Congress amended the Communications Act in 1993 to authorize competitive bidding for spectrum licenses, it created the DE program to help reduce market-entry barriers faced by small businesses, rural telephone companies and businesses owned by minority groups and women.

Doyon, Limited has participated in the DE program past auctions including Auction 35 in 2000, Auction 66 in 2007 and, most recently, Auction 97 in 2015. The DE program has been successful

in accomplishing a number of important goals. It's a good investment that pays multiple dividends for small businesses, consumers, taxpayers and the government treasury. Without the DE program, Doyon would never be able to compete in the communications sector, and significant investment opportunities would be closed off to shareholders.

The communications sector has too often seen excessive concentration of licenses with too few companies. The DE program broadens the number of companies holding licenses by allowing new entry in the market, which in turn creates a more competitive environment. This is good for innovation, good for equitable service deployment and good for consumers.

By allowing businesses like Doyon to partner with larger carriers and bid at a discount, the DE program protects smaller companies from

MESSAGE TO SHAREHOLDERS

Dear Shareholders,

I hope the summer has been good to you so far. For our shareholders in the Interior, it has been a tough month or so, particularly in the communities of Tanana and Nulato, where they have been battling wildfires close to homes and structures. Unfortunately, the state is on track to break the previous record for the number of acres burned. We have worked closely with Tanana Chiefs Conference to respond to the fires and assist those displaced by evacuations. Our thoughts are with the shareholders and other community members impacted by these recent events, especially those evacuated.

I'm excited to announce that Doyon, Limited and Doyon Drilling, Inc. (DDI) recently entered a deal with Caelus Energy for work on the North Slope. This new contract with Caelus ensures that all seven of DDI's rigs will work in our fiscal year 2016! The work, which will utilize DDI's Arctic Fox drilling rig, will take place in the Smith Bay field during the winter exploration season. As part of the transaction, Doyon, Limited has acquired an overriding royalty interest and carried working interest in the Smith Bay leases with the potential for significant future financial benefits.

In the summer of 2016, Doyon will continue our oil and gas exploration program in the Nenana/Minto Flats Basin. The encouraging results from the Nunivak #2 well drilled in 2013 and the 3D seismic program from fall 2014

led us to decide to drill a third well in the area. Following the completion of the Caelus contract on the North Slope, DDI will transport the Arctic Fox to Nenana to begin the drilling program. The opportunity to create a new industry in Interior Alaska is truly exciting, especially when it holds the promise of a less expensive, locally produced and cleaner-burning fuel for Interior residents. More information about timing and any employment opportunities will be shared in future newsletter articles.



Doyon continues fiscal year 2015 with strong financial performance, and we expect to close out the year well ahead of our budget set in August 2014. Later this month, we expect the board to approve the 2016 operating and capital budgets, along with the goals and direction established at the May planning session.

In closing, I wish your children much luck for a successful school year. As always, I appreciate your continued support of Doyon.

being priced out. When small, minority- or women-owned businesses are allowed to effectively participate in the bidding process, the communities they represent are able to benefit from their entrance into the communications market. This is good for underserved populations, who gain greater access to economic opportunities, in addition to expanded service in communities across the U.S.

Finally, spectrum auctions contribute significant revenues to the Federal Treasury. When only large incumbent carriers participate in bidding, auction revenues are diminished. The DE

program brings more participants to these auctions. More participation means more bids. More bids means increased prices, which means more revenue to the Treasury. This is good for the federal budget and for taxpayers. For example, industry analysts predicted that Auction 97 would attract approximately \$18 million in bids. In fact, Auction 97 generated a record-breaking \$43 billion in bids, revenues that flow directly to the Federal Treasury. Independent analysis shows that this extra revenue was due to increased participation in the auction, much of it through the DE program.

CELEBRATION MARKS 100-YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF HISTORIC MEETING

On July 6, 2015, Tanana Chiefs Conference hosted an event commemorating the day that seven chiefs, representing people from Interior Alaska, met with Judge James Wickersham on the banks of the Tanana River. The weather was very similar to what was experienced 100 years ago, as were the topics discussed.

The day of celebration started at the University of Alaska Fairbanks Troth Yeddha' Park, where Elders blessed the site and university officials and Native leaders described the positive partnerships that have developed over the last 100 years between the university system and Native people around the state. Ultimately, the Troth Yeddha' site will be home to an indigenous studies center, a place dedicated to keeping indigenous knowledge and practices alive.

Following the opening remarks, those in attendance walked and sang Native songs as they proceeded to the cornerstone of the university campus for a re-dedication ceremony.

The day continued at the Chief David Salmon Tribal Hall with a panel discussion on land, education, health and employment, which were the same four topics that were discussed in 1915 by Chief Alexander of Tolovana, Chief William of Tanana, Chief Thomas of Nenana, Paul Williams of Tanana, Chief Ivan of Crossjacket, Chief Charlie of Minto, Chief William of Tanana, Judge Wickersham and other officials. Serving on the panel were Steve Ginnis, executive director of Fairbanks Native Association; Evon Peter, vice chancellor at the University of Alaska Fairbanks; Aaron Schutt, president and CEO of Doyon, Limited; and Natasha Singh, general counsel of Tanana Chiefs Conference.

The day concluded with a potlatch featuring Native foods for almost 500 people, as well as singing and dancing.

"This special event was a day of remembrance, celebration, honor, pride and hope for what is to come in the next 100 years," Schutt said.

- **The Daaga' Community Service Award** recognizes a community or individual who shows strong commitment, competence and sensitivity in helping others to make their community a healthier and safer place to live, and whose accomplishments have directly affected Alaska Natives.
- **The Doyon Citizen of the Year Award** recognizes a person who has demonstrated leadership, strong commitment, competence and sensitivity in the educational and cultural survival of Alaska Natives. Recipients may be chosen for contributions in the fields of health or education, maintenance of a traditional lifestyle, or for the example they set as parents.
- **The Richard Frank Military Service Award** recognizes a veteran or active service member in good standing of any of the military service branches who has demonstrated strong leadership qualities in service to our country and commitment to fellow Alaska Natives and/or military families.

The large incumbent carriers were still the largest bidders in Auction 97. However, smaller entities were also able to submit winning bids through strategic DE partnerships, as Doyon successfully did through a partnership with DISH Network called Northstar Wireless. Far from new or unprecedented, virtually all of the current large carriers have partnered with a DE in previous auctions.


Richardson is currently attending the University of Alaska Anchorage, where he is pursuing a bachelor's of science degree in construction project management.

HR/SHAREHOLDER OUTREACH UPDATE: 6 TIPS FOR A GREAT JOB INTERVIEW

Congratulations! You got the interview for the job you want ... now what do you do?

When interviewing for a position in a competitive job market at a company like Doyon, Limited, you need to know how to make yourself stand out from the competition. Here are a few simple steps you can take to help interviewers remember you:

1. **Be prepared.** Research the company because the better informed you are, the better your answers will be to their questions. Learn something about the company that interests you as it will help in answering the question, "Why do you want to work here?" Doyon has valuable information at www.doyon.com about the company and its subsidiaries.
2. **Be familiar with the job description.** Part of your interview preparation includes being familiar with what the company is looking for in the position. This is the greatest opportunity for you to align your answers with the skills needed and show how you are an ideal fit for the job. Doyon has job descriptions for each position posted at www.doyon.com.
3. **Dress for success.** You don't have to buy an expensive outfit for an interview. The important thing is to look clean and put together.
4. **Be on time.** Head for the interview early so you have extra time to deal with traffic delays or unexpected problems. You will be more relaxed and feel more prepared if you arrive 10 minutes before the interview is scheduled to start.
5. **Be friendly.** Be polite to everyone you meet at the interview. A smile and a firm handshake are musts. You want to come across as personable and friendly. If you are interviewed by a panel, address all the participants.
6. **Stay positive.** Interviewers pay close attention to how questions are answered. Give positive answers and solutions. Do not talk negatively about previous supervisors or jobs.




Settle graduated from Galena City School and went on to get his instrumentation technician certificate from the University of Alaska Fairbanks, Tanana Valley Campus.
