## Shareholders to Receive Dividend of \$5.99 per Share

Doyon, Limited will distribute a dividend of \$5.99 per share, or \$599 per 100 shares, to shareholders on Tuesday, December 6, 2016. The Doyon board of directors approved the shareholder dividend during their quarterly meeting on August 20 in Fairbanks, Alaska.

“In December, Doyon will distribute its 30th consecutive dividend to its shareholders,” said Doyon President and CEO Aaron Schutt. “Being able to distribute over \$11 million to 19,500 shareholders is something we’re very proud to be able to do, especially in light of Alaska’s economic climate.”

Doyon’s dividend policy states that 50 percent of the corporation’s five-year average net income will be paid out as dividends. Based on the policy, Doyon will pay \$11,440,689 in dividends for the year 2016. As 75 percent

of Doyon’s shareholders reside in Alaska, this translates to approximately \$8.8 million being added to Alaska’s economy.

The following are important dates to keep in mind to receive a dividend on time:

- **November 8, 5 p.m. AKST:** Deadline to apply for direct deposit
- **November 21, 5 p.m. AKST:** Deadline to make address changes and apply for Class C enrollment
- **December 6:** Dividends direct deposited or mailed to the address on file as of November 22

Signing up for direct deposit and updating addresses ahead of time will minimize dividend receipt delays.

## Message to Shareholders

Dear Shareholders,

Another fiscal year came to a close for Doyon on September 30. We expect this past year to be the second-best financial year we've had in the company's history. In spite of the tough year with continued low oil prices, Doyon was still able to make a significant profit. Unfortunately, shareholder hire is not as high as we had hoped, but it remains a top priority for the board and management.

The past few months have been eventful for Doyon. In August, we held a quarterly board meeting where we had the opportunity to meet with Alaska's U.S. senators, Sen. Lisa Murkowski and Sen. Dan Sullivan.

Sen. Sullivan reported on efforts to address water and sewer issues in rural Alaska through proposed legislation by the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee. He also reported on legislation giving Vietnam veterans the opportunity to choose Native allotments, as some weren't able to do so while fighting in the war. Doyon has a long history of working with veterans to obtain allotments in our region, including on Doyon-selected ANCSA lands, and fully supports this bill.

Sen. Murkowski spoke about protections for Alaska Native lands guaranteed through the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA). She also discussed the Alaska Native Land Claims Improvement Act, which includes language requiring the secretary of the Interior to convey lands to the Gwich'in people of Canyon Village. Having both U.S. senators join the board meeting was an honor for us.

Also at the quarterly board meeting, the

directors approved a shareholder dividend distribution of \$5.99 per share, or \$599 per 100 shares. We are proud to be able to distribute a shareholder dividend for the 30th consecutive year. Doyon will pay \$11,440,689 in dividends, of which \$8.8 million will go to Alaska-based shareholders. Be sure to update your address and direct deposit information, if either has changed, before the deadlines. November 8 is the deadline to apply for direct deposit, and November 21 is the deadline to make address changes.

Finally, the community continues to prepare for the 50th AFN convention, which will take place in Fairbanks this month. Each year, Doyon submits the names of our Shareholder of the Year award recipients to AFN for their awards. I'm looking forward to seeing if any of our distinguished shareholders will be chosen for the AFN awards.

I'm also pleased to report that Fairbanks Native Association, Tanana Chiefs Conference and Doyon are working together on the AFN Welcome and Fairbanks Four Potlatch on Wednesday, October 19 at 6 p.m. at the Big Dipper. All are invited to attend as we welcome our guests to the Interior.

I look forward to seeing many of you during AFN week in Fairbanks and at this fall's Dialogue with Doyon sessions. Thank you for your continued support.

Excitement is building about the 50th Alaska Federation of Natives (AFN) convention, which will take place October 20 – 22 in Fairbanks, Alaska. Planning committees continue to prepare for the 4,000 – 5,000 expected visitors.

Fairbanks Native Association, Tanana Chiefs Conference and Doyon, Limited are planning the AFN Welcome and Fairbanks Four Potlatch on Wednesday, October 19 at 6 p.m. at the Big Dipper Ice Arena in Fairbanks. Transportation from major area hotels will be available to and from the Big Dipper.

“The AFN Welcome and Fairbanks Four Potlatch is a lot of hard work, but it’s definitely worthwhile,” said Melissa Charlie, potlatch committee co-chair. “The Native people of the Interior want to give our guests a warm welcome to Fairbanks.”

During the 2013 AFN convention in Fairbanks, the Interior Native organizations hosted a potlatch that was attended by approximately 2,500 guests. It took over 200 volunteers donating over 700 hours of their time to successfully pull off such an event.

“The potlatch in 2013 was an incredible undertaking,” recalled Tonya Garnett, co-chair of the potlatch committee. “Working side-by-side with the other Native organizations to welcome so many people to Fairbanks was an incredible experience.”

## Doyon Board Meets with U.S. Senators

The Doyon, Limited board of directors had the opportunity to meet with Alaska’s U.S. senators during the Doyon quarterly board meeting on August 20 in Fairbanks, Alaska.

Sen. Dan Sullivan attended the meeting to discuss some of the issues that are important to Alaskans and to answer questions from the Doyon board. Sen. Sullivan reported on increased funding for the Tribal Transportation program, which passed in the highway bill. He also provided an update on efforts to address water and sewer issues in rural Alaska through proposed legislation in the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee. He also expressed support for and reported on legislation giving Vietnam veterans the opportunity to choose Native allotments, as some weren’t able to do so while fighting in the war.

After Sen. Sullivan departed the meeting, Sen. Lisa Murkowski joined to provide an update on the work she’s

doing for Alaska and also to hear questions from the Doyon board. Sen. Murkowski spoke about protections for Alaska Native lands guaranteed through the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA). She also spoke about the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Improvement Act, which includes language requiring the secretary of the Interior to convey lands to Kian Tr’ee, the corporation for Canyon Village. For over 40 years, the Gwich’in people of Canyon Village have been denied their land claims provided by the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act.

“Today was a great day for Doyon,” said Doyon President and CEO Aaron Schutt. “I don’t think we’ve ever had both U.S. senators meet with us on the same day and spend as much time as they did. They provided in-depth updates and answered our questions. We appreciate that they made time in their busy schedules to spend with Doyon’s leadership.”

## Shareholder Spotlight: Officer Jon Gallen

Anchorage Police Department (APD) recruiter and backgrounds investigator Officer Jon Gallen is a Doyon, Limited Class C shareholder originally from Northway, Alaska. He is the son of James Gallen of Northway and Rebecca Gallen, who was born in Tanana. Gallen is the grandson of Ada and James Gallen, and Clara Clark and the late Ralph Holmberg, Sr. Gallen and his wife, Allison, live in Anchorage, where they are raising their three sons: Lucas, 13; Sean, 9; and Ryan, 2.



Gallen, who was raised in Northway, always knew he wanted to work in law enforcement. His father served as an Alaska State Trooper for over 35 years, inspiring Gallen to follow suite. Gallen often asked his father questions about being in law enforcement and, throughout his childhood, was taught that what he did as a youth could affect the opportunities available to him as an adult.

After graduating high school in Northway, Gallen joined the U.S. military where he served as a military policeman for five years with the intent to become a state trooper once his service was completed. After his service, Gallen was approached by the APD where more opportunities were available. He was eventually recruited as a patrol officer.

Gallen has since been with the APD for more than 12 years. In March, Gallen was offered the position of recruiter/backgrounds investigator. He now recruits police officers for the APD and performs background investigations on applicants, who face a very competitive environment, with only 5 percent of applicants successfully making it through the hiring process.

Gallen's goals within the APD include growing diversity on the force, employing more qualified Alaska Natives, and reaching out to youth about the importance of integrity and doing the right thing in order to create more opportunities for themselves in the future. Gallen has already met with the Alaska Youth Academy and Afognak Native Corporation youth. He looks forward to meeting with more youth groups to encourage them to make an impact in their communities by living a life of integrity, doing the right thing, and working toward future goals, which hopefully, for a few, will be in law enforcement.

"We do this to help people," Gallen said. "Being able to help people and assist in the hiring process to create a path for others to do the same has been a good experience."

## Get Out the Native Vote: Vote Yes on the PFD Voter Initiative

A 2011 Alaska Divisions of Elections report found that approximately 70,000 Alaskans qualify for the Permanent Fund Dividend (PFD), but are not registered to vote. If Ballot Measure 1, the PFD voter registration ballot initiative, is passed in the general election on November 8, all PFD applicants would automatically have their address and voter registration updated with the Division of Elections. The ballot initiative includes an opt-out feature, so that a PFD applicant may decline to be registered to vote.

The PFD voter registration would also:

- Prevent voter registration fraud. The PFD division conducts a comprehensive fraud detection analysis and, if passed, the initiative will allow the Division of Elections to benefit from the detection work already underway.
- Save the state money. Currently, 83 percent of PFD applicants file their application online. A Pew study has shown that electronic registrations cost 10 times less than paper processing.
- Improve registration accuracy. Online voter registration drastically reduces the potential for data entry errors that can happen in the paper processing transfer.
- Make government spending more efficient. The PFD voter registration would reduce the workload at the Division of Elections while making the dollars already spent on PFD application processing go further.

“By voting yes on Ballot Measure 1, Alaskans would be supporting a safe, cost-effective and accurate way to update and apply for voter registration through the PFD application process,” said Aaron Schutt, PFD voter initiative co-chair and president/CEO of Doyon, Limited.

As the initiative would reduce the number of required forms to complete, it would also make voting easier, especially for young Alaskans, new residents, non-English speakers, members of the military, and Alaskans with disabilities. Plus, voters living in rural Alaska would be able to vote an absentee ballot and participate in early voting if there was not a polling place readily available on Election Day.

Voters who have trouble getting to the polls on Election Day may have a personal representative pick up a special needs ballot at any early/in-person voting site beginning 15 days prior to Election Day. The ballot can also be obtained and turned in on Election Day by anyone other than candidates running for office.
